

#### 09.40-13:00 Panel 1: Human Rights and minority language education

Is there a right to education in, or teaching of, a minority language, and if so to what extent and under what conditions? This is one of the central issues for many minority communities around the world. While some European instruments address this, these tend to still be fairly general, open to interpretation, or even misunderstood, particularly in relation to the relationship between human rights obligations and the use of (minority) languages in education.

The session will discuss the interaction between existing human rights standards and education in minority languages, considering the extent and/or conditions for such rights claims. The session will also look at what minorities actually want when it comes to the teaching of and in their languages, as well as what States can provide when considering the principles of proportionality and reasonableness.

Having a right to education in a minority language is meaningless if appropriate resources and effective approaches are not in place. There can be a variety of obstacles of a practical nature to the effective implementation of human rights in education for minorities. Widespread misunderstandings need to be dispelled, particularly on the cost-effectiveness of education in minority languages.

The session will discuss how to guarantee equality in quality education for minority languages in education, addressing a number of areas such as the cost effectiveness of education in minority language, funding issues, management structures, and teaching training and textbooks requirements.
